Grade 3

To learn more about black history in the grade 3 classroom we watched some videos about Amber Valley, also called "Secret Alberta" near

Athabasca. The students were interested in learning more about the people that came from the United States to Amber Valley, to make that area their home. They learned that the black people and their ancestors experienced slavery, so in 1905 they came to Canada to escape racism. At one time there were stamps made about Amber Valley, so during our art classes this week the students made their own stamps reflecting the lives of the people that lived in Amber Valley. We used our mathematical minds to figure out how long ago (1905 to the present) the black people first came here.



Grade 4

Brrrr! February was a chilly one. So glad that it has started to warm up and spring is in sight! This month we have made the most of the school days despite the inclement weather and continued to explore measurement in math and simple machines in science. During our STEAM class, students experimented by creating structures with spaghetti and marshmallows for materials. We found out that the triangle is the strongest formation and capable of holding its shape. Have a great March!

Grade 5

The grade 5 class has had a busy month. We spend some of our physical education classes learning how to curl and we will be going skating a couple of times in the next few weeks. We have also started our social studies group project called the "suitcase project" where we are trying to convince people to move to our region by highlighting nice things about it. 10 Crazy Facts You Didn't Know About Space

1. SPACE IS COMPLETELY SILENT

There is no atmosphere in space, which means that sound has no medium or way to travel to be heard.



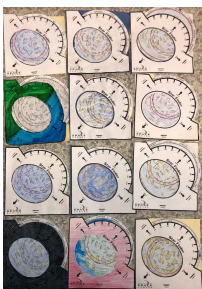
2. THE HOTTEST PLANET IN OUR SOLAR SYSTEM IS 450° C.

Venus is the hottest planet in the solar system and has an

average surface temperature of around 450° C.

3. A FULL NASA SPACE SUIT COSTS \$12,000,000.

While the entire suit costs a cool \$12m, 70% of that cost is for the backpack and control module.



4. THE SUN'S MASS TAKES UP 99.86% OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM.

The Sun accounts for 99.86% of the mass in our solar system with a mass of around 330,000 times that of Earth.

5. ONE MILLION EARTHS CAN FIT INSIDE THE SUN

The Sun is large enough that approximately 1.3 million Earths could fit inside (if squashed in) or if the Earths retained their spherical shape then 960,000 would fit.



6. THERE ARE MORE TREES ON EARTH THAN STARS IN THE MILKY WAY

There are about **three trillion trees** on Planet Earth, and between **100-400 billion stars**, approximately, in the galaxy.

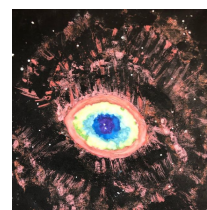
7. THE SUNSET ON MARS APPEARS BLUE

Just as colors are made more dramatic in sunsets on Earth, sunsets on Mars, **according to NASA**, would appear bluish to human observers watching from the red planet.



8. THERE ARE MORE STARS IN THE UNIVERSE THAN GRAINS OF SANDS ON EARTH

The universe extends far beyond our own galaxy, *The Milky Way*, which is why scientists can only estimate how many stars are in space. However, **scientists estimate** the universe contains approximately 1,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 stars, or a septillion.



9. ONE DAY ON VENUS IS LONGER THAN ONE YEAR.

Venus has a slow axis rotation which takes 243 Earth days to complete its day. The orbit of Venus around the Sun is 225 Earth days, making a year on Venus 18 days less than a day on Venus.

10. THERE IS A PLANET MADE OF DIAMONDS

We set the stage for many discussions and lessons around the topic of racism and discrimination, black history month, and kindness month. Our final lesson was a demonstration of what segregation and discrimination feel like.

Students had been randomly divided into two groups - one group was treated like the cream of the crop and the other was treated poorly. The reaction of the overall group was very interesting to observe. Only one student, who was being treated unfairly, had the courage to

stand up and speak out against the unfair treatment of half the class. Take time to ask your child about how they felt when they were treated differently - I think you will find it to be an interesting conversation.

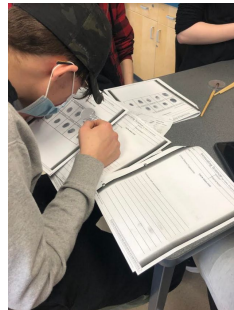
Grade 9 Math

Mrs. White's Math 9's watched the movie "Hidden Figures", which is about the huge contribution to math and science from three African American women in 1961. "As the United States raced against Russia to put a man in space, NASA found untapped talent in a group of African-American female mathematicians that served as the brains behind one of the greatest operations in U.S. history. Based on the unbelievably true life stories of three of these women, known as "human computers", we follow these women as they quickly rose the ranks of NASA alongside many of history's greatest minds specifically tasked with calculating the momentous launch of astronaut John Glenn into orbit, and guaranteeing his safe return."

Some of the questions students had to answer included:

- o What are the contributions of the women in the hidden figures?
- o How would their achievements inspire mathematics study?
- o How would you model your life after these mathematicians?
- o How did the true story of the black female mathematicians at NASA helped in the civil rights movement?
- o How did their achievements in space—contribute to our understanding of race, discrimination, and achievement in modern America?

Forensics 25



Mrs. White's Forensics 25 class has been learning about notorious criminals that were convicted with fingerprint evidence. They have done many activities to classify and analyze

fingerprints. In this lab, students lifted fingerprints off of a sheet of acetate "found at crime scene" and had to figure out which of their classmates the prints matched to.

PE Class at the Rinks!

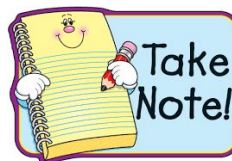


We have been very fortunate to coordinate some off-site activities for many of our PE classes as February comes to a close and we head into
